
Headteacher's Message

This Term's Value - Respect

In Year 6, our topic is the World at War and through our English book 'Letters from the Lighthouse' we have been thinking about life as an evacuee. Could you send your children to the countryside for safety?

Below is some of the children's work, writing in the first person, as an evacuee.

Following the blast, my mother came to the conclusion that we had to evacuate, since London was too dangerous. Cliff and I were on a train to Budmouth Point. More than anything I wanted to stay with my family; however, I do get to go on an adventure. If I were to have children living in London (which is a dangerous place during the war) I would hope they were safe and loved in their new home. Whilst boarding the train, I wondered if mum would be protected.

When silence was finally restored and the smoke had cleared, mother decided London was becoming too dangerous and we were swiftly evacuated to Budmouth on the train, for our safety. I was desperate to stay and investigate Sukie's sudden disappearance, on the other hand, bombs are becoming more frequent. If I were in mother's position, I would have wanted my children to live safely in the countryside, away from the immense bombing raids in the city and survive the war. As I gazed out of the train window, I was beginning to wonder if I would ever see her warm smile again.

As the blasts subsided, mother made her mind up that it was far too dangerous to stay in London and sent us on a journey to Budmouth to evacuate from the air raids. The trees waved goodbye, as well as mum, then they disappeared over the horizon, whilst I was fading into the misty fog on the train. I must stay and look after my mum; but on the other hand, I had to make sure Cliff was safe in Devon. If my children were in danger, I would want them to have a loving family, be educated and survive the war. In my mind, I was wondering if I'd ever hug my mum again. By Zara

Norwich Class kicked off the new term with an "out of this world" experience to launch our latest Science topic. A visit from StarLincs Mobile Planetarium set the tone for an exciting term ahead. Inside the Planetarium, our astronomer Lucy guided us through the wonders of our galaxy, the Milky Way. We explored the sun, planets, and incredible star constellations, experiencing many "wow" moments as we grasped the vastness of our universe.

We learned fascinating facts, such as Earth's unique position in the Goldilocks Zone, where conditions are perfect for life (not too hot, not too cold, just right!).

Back in the classroom, the excitement continued with engaging activities. We built moon landing vehicles from Lego, tasted astronaut freeze-dried raspberries, and even designed our own planets. It was an unforgettable day of discovery!

Healthy School


As a school, we aim to promote healthy lifestyles as much as possible. Part of this includes the food that the children are eating. At break time, we provide all children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 with a piece of fruit or vegetable. In Key Stage 2, children may bring in their own piece of fruit or vegetable to consume at break time. Children should not be eating other items at this time e.g. crisps. This is to ensure that we are promoting healthy lifestyles as much as possible. Our school meals provider, Ideal, follows the 'School Meals Food Standards' set out by the government (please click here for details). We strongly encourage that packed lunches brought in from home also follow the guidelines, to ensure all children are enjoying a balanced, healthy diet whilst in school. Clubs

Spring Term clubs began this week and will run up until the week ending Friday 28th March. My thanks to all staff running clubs this term and the commitment that they put into these. Year 5 and 6 children that have permission to walk alone must be collected by a known adult from all clubs up until 14th February, in order to safeguard the children with the darker evenings. From 24th February, these children will be able to walk home from clubs by themselves.

World Book Day

World Book Day will be celebrated at St. Andrew's on Thursday 6th March. The children will have the opportunity to take part in reading/book related activities on the day. In addition to this, we will be inviting the children to come into school dressed as their favourite book character. A simple costume will suffice and it would be lovely if the children could bring a copy of the book that their character is from. Please bear in mind that the children will be taking part in usual school activities during the day so their costume needs to be appropriate and practical for this. For this reason, we request that hair dye and make up/face paint is avoided. Staff have been invited to dress up on this day too and I am sure it will be a memorable occasion. At the end of the day, the children will bring home their World Book Day £1 token, which can be used at most retailers for a discount on books. Children may wish to save these for our Travelling Book Fayre which will arrive later in March - more details will be given on this nearer the time.
