This Term's Value - Forgiveness

We will be exploring this value over the course of this term as part of our Collective Worship sessions, through writing prayers, in class and around the school. World Book Day

There was lots of excitement in school yesterday as we celebrated World Book Day. The children (and staff!) looked great in their character outfits and everyone enjoyed the range of book related activities that took place. Each class focused on the book 'Here we are,' by Oliver Jeffers, and produced work linked to the themes in the text. A particular highlight of the day was our 'Masked Reader' event, involving a number of staff reading their favourite stories with their faces disguised. This provoked lots of discussion as to who the mystery readers were, which was revealed in Collective Worship yesterday morning (which included a few surprises...).

All children received a World Book Day token, which takes £1 off the price of a book. We hope the children are able to use these to further promote a love of reading (these can be used at the book fayre later this month, further details in this newsletter).











Canterbury Update (Year 3)



On Tuesday 11th March, we went to visit the woods as part of our Prehistoric Britain topic. When we arrived, we were greeted by Maria and Matthew, who led us to our camp in the woods for the day. We were excited to see a huge tent, which we used as our base and a campfire burning away to keep us warm.

Our first activity was to consider the spear of time, Mrs Bell was really amazed that we had so much knowledge of pre-history! We then got to touch and look at Stone Age tools, weapons and clothing! We were in awe of the reindeer coat, the hand axe as well as the bags made of tree bark. We then watched Matthew fire the bows and arrows at a pretend animal – it was amazing how the weapons had evolved over time.

Next we made shelters in teams using all the wood we could find in the area, as well as leaves and twigs. We worked really well in our teams and made some great shelters – some of us could even fit in them! We then made our own fires using special tools, cotton wool and lots of sticks. We were all successful firelighters!

After lunch, some of us gutted a fish and Matthew cooked it on the fire. Once the fish was cooked lots of us enjoyed a taste of it and we thought it was delicious. We then considered how water would be boiled in the Stone Age. As they didn't have metal it would have been impossible to boil water over a fire. We were amazed when hot rocks were placed in a wooden trough with water and the water fizzed and bubbled with the heat. Stone Age people were very clever!

Finally we played a game called eagles nest as a class. Mrs Bell was in the nest and we all went to hide, we had to try not to be spotted! The aim of the game was to get as close to the nest as possible without being spotted. Some of us were very good at hiding!

Overall we had a brilliant day and we enjoyed all the different activities. Our grown ups were so proud of us and had a super day with us all too!









Salisbury Update (Year 4)



Year 4 have had an exciting few weeks. The start of the Spring term saw the class attend swimming lessons at Sleaford Leisure Centre. Over the course of the 5 weeks the children all made super progress: some felt confident to take feet of the floor, float and be able to swim a width of the pool. Others made progress by fine tuning their individual strokes, focusing on technique and becoming more efficient swimmers. What was great to hear were many of the class wanting to build on last year's achievements and clock up a greater number of lengths completed all of which resonated beautifully with our PSHE focus at the time of Dreams and Goals and achieving success through hard work and commitment.

More recently, linked with our current Science theme of 'Sound', Salisbury class enjoyed meeting Dan from School of Noise who visited school and delivered, during the course of a morning, a workshop linked to sound and the science behind this area of physics. The children spent the morning exploring various pieces of equipment – some of which were quite strange looking and sounding – but gave the class the opportunity to really explore what sound is, how it can be produced and how sound can offer career opportunities. They even witnessed how sound can create art! The session finished with the children becoming Foley's Actors and adding sound affects to silent film. It was amazing to see/hear how adding simply created sound affects using everyday household materials really can bring film footage to life and make it more believable.

A wonderful start to 2025 and we are all looking forward to what the second half of year 4 will bring.
